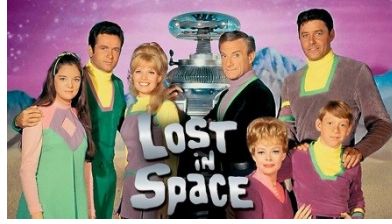


TV Sci-Fi series quiz answers!



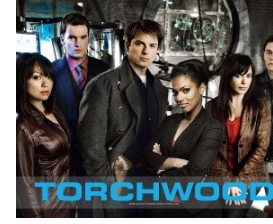
Featuring a very motley crew of outlaws and Jim Henson puppets aboard a living ship, *Farscape* was abruptly cancelled after season 4.



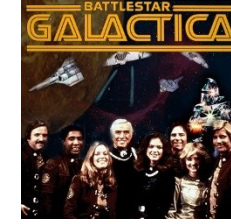
Back in the mid-60s, they clearly believed the space travellers of 1997 would wear velour. *Lots of velour.*

Fooled you! It's the 1978 version, not the 2004 reboot!



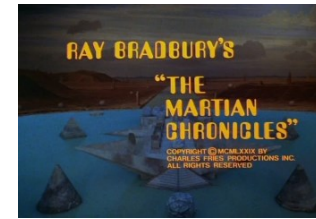
Mork calling Orson.... And a whole generation grew up saying *nanu nanu*.

55 years on, and stronger than ever, it brought us a fear of Daleks, Cybermen and statues of angels. And a love of jelly babies.



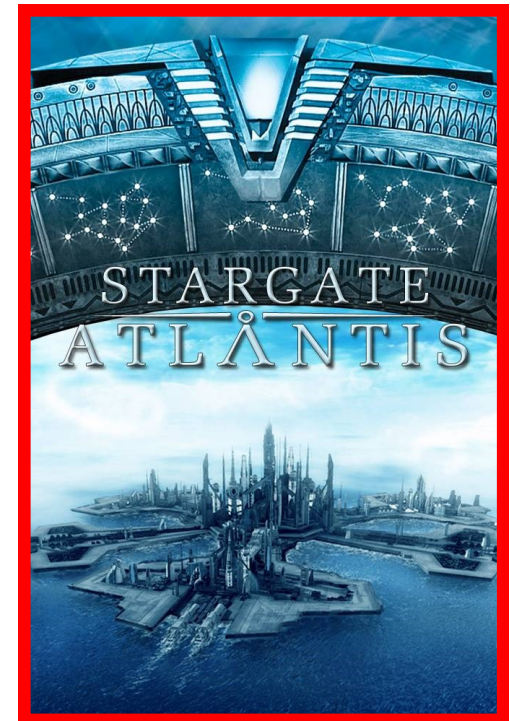
The Babylon 5 space station was a trade and diplomatic centre, and the series was aimed at reflecting issues of race, religion and politics.
